VISITING WITH KIDS?

MUSEUM BUILDING (OLD CUSTOM'S HOUSE)

The Museum building was constructed in the late 1890s as a general store owned by pearlers Newman & Goldstein. By 1910 Customs had moved in and they

occupied it until 1979. The Broome Historical Society has run the Broome Museum from here since 1981.



THE SAILMAKER'S SHED

The Sailmakers Shed was built circa 1897 to house Charles Bagge's sailmaking business. After years of neglect a demolition order was placed on it.



However, the Broome
Historical Society was able
to save and restore it,
winning a WA Heritage
Award and a UNESCO High
Commendation in the
process.

THE RAE VAL ANNEXE

This building was formerly the mess hall for the employees of the Public Works Department when

the Port of Broome was under construction.
The Broome Historical Society had it relocated to its present site and renovated to house its expanding collection.
